

#### **GAPS, CHALLENGES, ISSUES**


We have been experiencing MIS issues related to the JobsLA conversion. Our WIA team is working







# **Labor2 (2<sup>nd</sup> Chance Grant)**

#### Awaiting grant implementation (outreach/recruitment to commence in May 2015).

Grant description: Recruit, assess, enroll and train juveniles in the field of green automotive technology and green construction technologies prior to release. Provide intensive case management, mental health/substance abuse counseling and treatment and job readiness to enhance employability of youth ex-offenders ages 16-24 through career pathways in technology-based careers.

# LA Healthcare Competencies to Careers Consortium (LAH3C)

Grant description: Assist the Los Angeles Healthcare Competencies to Careers Consortium (LA H3C) introducing youth to healthcare via competency based curriculum that prepares students for the rapidly changing health care career environment. Staff will outreach and enroll youth into LACCD's LA H3C, facilitate/coordinate staff

#### **EDUCATION /OCCUPATIONAL SKILLS TRAINING**





• In the month of April, 21 youth completed CPR/First Aid certification trainings by Medics on the Move. The 8-hour training covers topics such as responding to emergencies, how to treat wounds, and communicating with paramedics. With this certification youth can obtain entry level jobs such as a life guard, security officer, construction worker, child care provider, and much more.





• This month the SCE Federal Credit Union conducted a Financial Literacy Workshop for our youth. They taught the importance of money management, budgets, checking/savings accounts, credit, dangers of fraud/predatory lending, etc. The purpose is to equip our youth to be fiscally responsible as they prepare to enter the workforce.





 On April 30, our onsite Charter School (Five Keys) held its awards ceremony to honor two of their new high school graduates, Alfonso Gallardo and Jonathan Mendoza. Congratulations to both for all their hard work and perseverance! Other student achievements were also celebrated in front of family and friends.

# **BH YouthSource Center Core Competencies:**





 Our onsite college, the Bridge Program at Antioch University Los Angeles (AULA), has been doing something simply revolutionary: providing college classes to low-income adults in Los Angeles, at no cost to students. Bridge students earn up to fifteen units of college credit while studying philosophy, literature, art history, and writing over a nine-month period—while studying the cultures, landscapes, and histories of Los Angeles neighborhoods. Classes at the Boyle Heights Tech Center take place Mondays and Wednesdays from 5:30-9:00 p.m.



• The students from our High Risk High Need (HRHN) Program at Franklin High School proudly display their newly created shirts. They just commenced their internships at the William C. Velasquez Institute Program (WCVP), whose focus is on combatting environmental issues impacting the Northeast Los Angeles Area. The student interns will be working on community beautification projects along the Los Angeles River and promoting the first ever Urban Camp-Out at Marsh Park.

#### **WORK READINESS/SUBSIDIZED & UNSUBSIDZED EMPLOYMENT**



#### **BH YouthSource Center Core Competencies:**

- The Transitional Subsidized Employment (TSE) is an 8-month internship offered to CALWORKS recipients. We currently host eight tremendous workers at the Tech Center. The TSE interns assist in every facet of our program. Two interns serve as classroom aides for our onsite LA County of Education High School, one assists with janitorial maintenance and keeps our facility spotless, and others support our reception area and staff with making phone calls, greeting customers, organizing events, preparing rooms for meetings, conducting outreach and many other tasks.
- Currently we have 222 youth stationed at various worksites throughout the City gaining invaluable
  work experience. A total of 467 youth will complete their internship by June 30, 2015). All youth
  must complete the Work Readiness training prior to being placed to ensure that they have been
  properly trained and screened. Beneath is a status of each grant to date:

Internship orientations take place weekly to provide an overview and expectations of the paid work
experience. The youth learn about workplace attire, punctuality, performance, how to complete and
submit time sheets, etc. Youth are also matched with one of our 35+ worksites throughout LA City,
including the Boys & Girls Clubs, Hollenbeck Retirement Home, Good Samaritan Hospital and City
Hall.

19 year old high school graduate, Genesis completed 150 hours at Hollenbeck Palms Retirement Center, where she assisted in planning senior activities and administrative duties for the operations staff.

Ana is assigned with assisting the internship coordinators at Boyle Heights YouthSource Center with clerical duties and aiding them with filing, memos and other important tasks associated with the work experience programs.

As a Medical Billing Assistant, Alex is gaining clinical and administrative experience with the 250 hours assigned to him. He is currently attending ELAC, studying Health Information Technology.

#### **Oscar Rico**

Oscar is placed at the Benjamin Franklin Public Library. He assists the Librarians by monitoring the open computer lab, checks in and organizes returned books and assists with sorting and filing duties.



They met with representatives from the Los Angeles agencies contracted under the LARCA grant to discuss best practices and implementation. The site visit entailed topics and forum style discussion on working with older and disconnected youth, the challenges each WIF grantee faced in serving this population and what best practices and innovative approaches that has made a difference. Our East County counterparts also listened to a successful youth engaged in the LARCA program at Boyle Heights and during their visit they were also able to tour the Technology Center.



Our onsite Five Keys Charter School students participated in a mask making project. #### **SUCCESS STORY OF THE MONTH**



**Alfonso Gallardo Ramirez** 

Alfonso migrated to the United States at the age of three. He recalls struggling with English and overall assimilation into a new environment. Things began to change for Alfonso by the time he entered high school. His grades improved and he began to thrive. His world, however, was turned upside down when his father became unemployed and his family was forced to abandon their apartment. They moved backed to Mexico, where Alfonso took up a job to help make ends meet, while sacrificing his education.

After a year in Mexico, Alfonso's family decided to return to restart their lives. They settled in the community of Boyle Heights. His father struggled to find employment and a place to live. Thus, Alfonso lived out of his father's truck, eating whatever warm meals his aunt and their family could afford. During his struggles, Alfonso enrolled in our LA Reconnections Careeer Academy (LARCA) program with the goal of receiving his high school diploma and entering a career in health care.

Despite all of his challenges, Alfonso graduated from our onsite Five Keys Charter School and received his High School Diploma. While pursuing his diploma, he concurrently enrolled at East Los Angeles Community College in the Health Information Technology Cohort (HIT) to pursue a career as a Medical Coder. To date he boasts a 3.8 GPA and is part of the honors society at ELAC for his academic achievements. Alfonso now plans on becoming a doctor one day and, and in his words, "When I become successful I am going to give back to the Tech Center for changing my life."
