#### **GAPS, CHALLENGES, ISSUES**






### LA Reconnections Career Academy (LARCA) Enrollment Status




### High Risk High Need (HRHN) Enrollment Status



### **General Fund (GF) Enrollment Status**



### **EDUCATION/OCCUPATIONAL SKILLS TRAINING**



On May 13th, students from BHTYC Five Keys Charter and Para Los Ninos came together
to present their science projects to their teachers, peers and parents. 24 Five Key Charter
School students diligently worked on their science experiments for a couple of
weeks. They decided on what was fun, interesting and creative for their
projects. Students were great at presenting as well as supporting their peers while they
presented. This event fostered a side of the youth that we don't often get to see. It was
a rewarding experience to witness.

Mitú and CreatorUp will be offering a
Digtal Bootcamp, a free program at the Tech
Center. As the voice of young Latinos, Mitú is
searching for the next generation of
storytellers, animators, and digital content
creators. Mitú's Digital Bootcamp, brought by
the Mitú Accelerator program and in partnership
with CreatorUp will boost youth's writing,
filming, editing and production skills.

This program will be open to Los Angeles residents, ages 18-24. The bootcamp will be run from June 17th to July 22nd. Three inperson sessions and weekly online courses will be offered. We're looking forward to launching this new and innovative Tech program next month. Special thanks to Lisa Salazar from the Mayor's office for connecting us with the Mitu organization.



 On May 19th, youth at Central Juvenile Hall took part in a live silk screening demonstration lead by Dewey Tafoya. Mr. Tafoya is a visual artist and screen printer, who grew up in Boyle Heights. He was excited to be part of the 2nd Chance grant since he has previously volunteered his talents with teens in continuation high schools throughout Los Angeles teaching screen printing and graphic design. The 2nd Chance grant targets incarcerated

youth by providing enrichment activities and linking them with program services when they are released from incarceration. Mr. Tafoya provided the stencils with his own original artwork. The youth learned to use the stencils and ink to create posters.



 WIOA participants interested in employment in a food service establishment are encouraged to obtain a Food Handler certificate. Having this certification provides the employer a potential employee who is already compliant. The training is provided online. On May 21st, we provided this training in our center's computer lab.
 Participants learned basic food safety practices for preparing and serving food.
 They all earned their food handler certificate from the National Restaurant Association.

On May 26th, security guard training was provided to WIOA participants. Mr. Aurelio Martin of the Guard Training Center came onsite to administer the training, the state registration fee process, handcuffing course and live scan services. These participants have been registered in the Department of Cultural Affairs BREEZE system and are now waiting for their guard card in the mail. We anticipate providing these newly trained participants job listings in security, loss prevention and event services.

• Lately, our center has been experiencing a wave of good news. Ours and our youth's two favorite words are, "You're hired!" Agreeing to be a site for recruitment for the Census 2016 project has proved to be beneficial. Susana Romero was hired as an Enumerator. She will be delivering and collecting census forms and working in direct contact with the public. Alfonso Gallardo and Jonnathan Garcia were hired at Naturalee, a warehouse distributor and roaster of dried fruits and nuts. This contact is from Scott Lee, our Executive Director. Alfonso and Jonathan's tasks include loading, unloading, sorting, arranging stock, and packing. Henry Milke has been working at Domino's since April. He works 30 plus hours as a delivery driver and assisting with orders. Henry has completed credits earning him his high school diploma, but he was initially working in the evenings and attending class in the morning. Henry expressed, "It's a great experience and I'm learning new things every day."

#### **BH YouthSource Center Core Competencies:**

On May 5<sup>th,</sup> the International Visitors Council of Los Angeles (IVCLA) brought five Tech-based entrepreneurs from Canada to the Tech Center as part of the "opportunities for Young Entrepreneurs" program. These five leaders are reformers and opinion makers who are invited to the country each year through the United States Department of State's International Leadership Program. They had a chance to tour our center, meet our partners and engage in a Q & A session about the programs and services we offer.



• In 2009, East L.A. Sports Scene had the great fortune of partnering with the Boyle Heights Technology Youth Center for continuation of its "In-Studio" programming. The purpose is to highlight all of the great athletes from the East Los Angeles area (current & former), through candid interviews and casual discussion. It's a great way to showcase all the talent coming out of our backyard.





• In the month of May, the Boyle Heights Tech Center teamed with the US Census to hire local residents as enumerators for the 2016 pre-count efforts. Application and interview sessions led to the hiring of approximately 150 US Census workers. Following their training, the new hires were armed with Iphones to commence their count efforts. The US Census hosted a debriefing session with the Tech Center staff, elected officials and other community based organizations to discuss strategies for higher participation rates for the official 2020 count.



- At our center's monthly partners meeting (aka "huddles"), on-site and off-site partners of
  the center are able to connect with one another. Information about upcoming activities,
  student progress and resources are shared. At this month's meeting, we were able to
  share in the fun of celebrating Cinco de Mayo with lively discussions, snacks and a themed
  picture taking opportunity.
- On May 13th, Los **Angeles** Trade Technical College Cosmetology and Barber program provided students haircuts and makeovers to the students at Theodore Roosevelt High School. In preparation for their event that prom night, male students received haircuts and female students had mini make-overs. A couple of staff also enjoyed a fresh new haircut. This event was made possible by BHTYC staff and the counseling staff High at Roosevelt School.

• On May 18, representatives from the Economic & Workforce Development Department (EWDD) and United States Department of Justice (DOJ) conducted a site visit of the Tech Center to review the 2<sup>nd</sup> Chance Grant.

Through this grant we currently serve 35 youth from Camp Challenger through services including legal counsel, academic assessment and support, technical training in green-related construction, mentoring, leadership skills, and workforce development services through the CRCD WorkSource Center.

All guests received a tour of the Tech Center and engaged with program staff regarding the challenges and successes of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Chance program.
